They come around in a hay rack and load us up and take us in. And we got wise to lot of things, you know. We'd go bare footed so we'd get new shoes. (Laughter) They'd take us in wagons, hay wagons, and lumber wagons. Load us and take us to school into there.

(How did they, you know, down there when you were going, how old were you when you was going down there?)

Down here at the...

(Yeah)

Uh-huh. I had long hair at the time, and like you know, Indian children had long hair and braids.
