## BACKGROUND OF INFORMANT:

Albert Makescry is 76 years o'd. He was born in 1893. He has lived on an Indian reservation all of his life and now resides west of Ponca City, Oklahoma. He attended Ponca Boarding School near White Eagle and Chilocco Indian School. Mr. Makescry is a veteran of World War I, a past leader of the Ponca tribe, and an officer in his church.
