(After you went to school down here, you went on up to Chilocco.) Yeah, I went to Chilocco. Yeah, after I knew what it's time, you know, . my father when he told me, he says, you know, he went o Juneau, you know, Juneau, Nebraska, my father, you know. Course, he didn't go through everything like that, but he went to school there for about two years or something like that. And he noticed what goes, went on there, you know. That is, as far as learning is concerned, you know, and what to do and so they wrote (not clear), you know. That's what it was. And he told me what to do and how to learn, you know. So, I studied, you know, studied the boys, you know, how they talk, talking English, you know. And I noticed that there was a, under military rules or military regulations. See, that's the way it was, Chilocco, Haskell, and Carlisle. I guess that's the way with other schools, you know, but that's the way with the schools at the time. See, they were under military, military, everything military home mission. That's why when we went into Army, why everything was just like it was back to school again. (Laughter) Only we didn't have to go to school. We knew how to drill and things like that, everything. The white fellows, you know, they don't know a thing about it, and we already knew about it, all about it, you know. It wasn't hard. It was that way when I was there and I just made up my mind to be prompt. It wasn't what you call, I was afraid of the employees, but you know, I just made up my mind that I just want to be prompt, be on time for everything. And first thing I knew I used to keep my hails clean. 'And my mails now are no good, are cracked now, but I used to keep them trim. And I noticed they have inspection every morning. They go through your finger nails, and if your fingers are dirty, they gave a demerit mark they call it, deprive you of your, some of your privileges that you enjoy at
