(Cheyenne too.)

Yeah, killing all the cattle down there. Regiment, they had a hard time with them too.

(And they had--had to put old Geronimo and a lot of those leaders you know--)

Yeah.

(Couldn't hardly corral them. Of course the white man he put 'em all in that Fort Sill you know. Stockade there.)

Yeah, Geronimo he--Geronimo he was all right. He didn't like white people.

He didn't like the way he been treated, you know.

(Yeah.)

That the reason it made him mean.

(Well, the white people would like it if them Indians treated them that way.)

That's way been told. Well, I heard it. I heard from some Indians, I believe it Sioux or Cheyenne--the white people went through there and kill them Indians you know. They want have fun--shoot them Indians. Shoot 'em. Say, "Kill
