And on the hill there, there's another gift shop. And if you run out of gas, Fred Wilson lives there--north side."

Later Fanman adds:

"Frank, here, tells me the story of how Dogpatch came to be--after Christmas broke up at Canton there was only four tents there and about forty dogs."

Guy Hicks calls up the individual drummers and the women who sang to receive money for their services.
