the echo of this drum and song. And perhaps he thought this was the place because there were two Kiowa women there that were talking Kiowa. And they told him this boy he was looking for was still strong. And they just had him this boy he was had for four days. And they fied him to where you hear this drum and song. He is tied there. He is staked out. His feet were tied and his arms were tied. So this man says, "Yeah, that's who I'm searching for. And he says, "When you all leave bring me two horses. So these women promised to help him. So he crawled to where the boy was tied and this drum was beating. And he looked and sure enough he seen this boy being staked out. And these people, this off tribe, would leave the bou there to die while they danced. So he was sitting there thinking how he was going to get this boy away. And he heard this boy that boy say, "Mother, Mother I'm so thirsty." And these other people didn't pay no mind to them, they danced on. And he thought what am I going to do. Well, I'm goin to take my gear off and he began to crawl on his belly. These people were dancing so bad that they ddn't even notice. That they had a stranger in the camp. He had his knife tied to his walst and he crawled over there and he said, "Son, I've come after you." He said, "I'm going to take you home." And the boy said, "I'm tied pretty tight. They have tied me with rawhide and when it was wet; and now that the sun has shined on it for four days and four nights, it has dried. And I can not get untied. It's pretty hard. And he said, "I'm going to cut you and I want you to get on my back. So he laid on his stomach. He cut his hands and feet. He laid on his stomach and the boy crawled on his back, laid on his back.
