INTERVIEW SITUATION AND BACKGROUND OF DISCUSSANTS: This interview is actually a group discussion which took place in the home of Mrs. Birdie May Tointigh (Mrs. Jack Tointigh). Birdie May is half Kiowa-Apache and half Kiowa and is the daughter of the late Ray Blackbear, Kiowa-Apache. Her husband, Jack, is beginning to earn his living working with German silver. They now live in the Blackbear place several miles west of Boone. Irene Poolaw is a Kiowa-Apache and the widow of the late Cletus Poolaw. She is a Chalepah and the sister of Alfred, Raymond and Clarence Chalepah, and Gertie Chalepah. Irene has a house near Boone where her son is living now, and is herself living with her sister in Anadarko. Roberta is a Comanche born and raised around Boone and is a member of the Pewo family. Her husband, Butch, is a Kiowa-Apache but is enrolled as a Kiowa. All three of these ladies have had experience recently in applying for loans for remodeling and building and in trying to get in on the current sanitation program. This discussion centers on the complexities of trying to take advantage of existing services for Indians through the B.I.A. and tribal committeemen. Also present and participating in the questioning are Arnold Henderson, from the School of Architecture at the University of Oklahoma, and Mike Davis, graduate student in Anthropology. Both Henderson and Davis are interested in housing problems among Indian people. Discussion begins with Henderson explaining his interest in current Indian housing programs. This interview is concluded on T-606
