Oh yes.

(There was?)

(Well, I want to see that sometime. What did they call it? Just--)

Younger Bend.

(Younger Bend.)

Yeah, its still standing. You pass right by it when you're going up to the dam. (Well, I'll look for it then.)

When you go up hill, you keep winding on around. The porch, I think, is about to fall off.

(Well, it was nice all the outlaws had a place to go to school, didn't they?)
Yes, they did.

(Probably didn't go though. Younger Bend is quite famous place in the western history books particularly. There must have been some good there. But they don't mention much about it. All they write about is the outlaws, the rough things that happened. But that's a beautiful country, as well as I remember, through there. Speaking of names, how did Briartown get it's name?)

Nobody knows.

(It's an unusual name.)

My dad said the only thing that the people long years ago figured was that down here in this bottom--
