

these Ghost Dance songs, and they used to go to sleep. These songs that are being put on your music, I used to sing them and put them to sleep with them.

(Are there other kind of songs you used to sing to the grandchildren, too, besides those songs?)

Yeah, just all kinds of songs I used to sing--War Dance--I try to put them to sleep and I sing them. Sing them any kind of songs just to put them to sleep. Forty-nine.

### LULLABIES

(Are there any just children's songs--sort of lullaby-type among the Arapahoes?)

No. There ain't any. Just--the only way the Arapahoes put their babies to sleep is-- (sings a brief phrase with pulsating tones)--that one. That's all. If it's a boy, they say, "Boy, go to sleep," and if it's a girl they say, "A girl, go to sleep."

(In Arapaho?)

Yeah.

(How would you say that "Boy, go to sleep"?)

(She sings this.)

(Let's see--on this Ghost Dance, you said they didn't have a drum when they did that?)

No, they didn't have no drum. They used to just hold hands together and dance around.

(And what kind of clothes would they wear?)

Just anything they could wear--just common clothes. They didn't have to dress up. Didn't have to have special costume. But these four men that used
