I worked for her, and then I started working for Lula Stan--Lula Stanley. And I had taken care of Lula's two children--Catherine and John Lee. And I took them out to Pa's with me when I went to work out there.

Yes. We had a--Pa had a round house built up in front of the old home place. And they had peyote meetings there. And I was sick one time--I had a kidney infection. Jack Spicer, he carried me the peyote tea down, and they had a
