As near back as they can retell and in the papers and in the things that-There hasn't been a full-blood Wyandotte in our band. In this band, since 1820 or '30 (1830). That's a long time back to have a full-blood. (Yes, It is.)

Because they brought them into the country where the Wyandotten intermingled. And they married off because they thought that was what they were going to have to do to keep going.

(Yeah.)

Unidentified speaker: I know my husband's people--grandmother was a full-blood. My land, how many years she been dead? Years and years and years.

Mrs. Vowel: 'Course now there are some who will say. Well, my mother, was a half-blood. I do believe they trace back carefully they find out that isn't so.

(Well, did they intermarry with other tribes considerably?)

Oh yes. They did.

(I would think so.)

Unidentified speaker: They did because I had a sister-in-law who almost full-blood. And her parents. She had to take one or the other of the other tribes.

(Yes ma'm.)

And so she was Wyandotte and what?
