REMOVAL OF WYANDOTTE TRIBE TO KANSAS CITY, KANSAS

When the Wyandottes came--When the people were moved from Ohio down that winter. And they put 'em into Kansas City and that district.

The conservative people in the group, in the tribe thought they were going to go back and live like they had before. They thought they were going to be able to hunt and fish and live like they want to.

And have no white people to bother 'em for a hundred years. That was their idea because that's what they'd been told.

(They were actually told that, too.)

They were told that. The papers, the writings that we left to 'em that. The old folks left some writings and things, you know. They told the younger ones who were writing. That was their idea, that within ten years after they got to Kansas City, the white people were already there. Taking up some of the land. So the conservative ones decided that they weren't going to live like that, be pushed around by those white people or pushed off again. So, they decided to come down here. And they came down to the Seneca Nation and they
