

(This tape was made at the Seneca Indian School.)

(Robert White is speaking in Indian language for about seven minutes of tape.)

(Mrs. Neiberding: What were you saying?)

Robert White: Well, I'm glad. As I was saying that I'm glad all the folks here is learning this Seneca language. And then, all of you folks is wanting to learn it too. 'Course, I know we have oh, four-five other one's that wasn't even kin--talk kin a lot better--probably a lot better than what us full bloods do. And what--and on the other hand, I'm really glad that you folks are really taking a lot of interest in this Indian language. In that way, you can understand our ceremonial--so, if can't understand it, you can look in your books what you have learned up to today. And as far--as classes goes on, why, they be--be a lot more (not clear) and really understand what it is.
