

(What about your father's sister?)

n 9 hei

(Again?)

n 9 hei

(Would you use n 9 hei if you're talking directly to her?)

Yeah-- n 9 hei h w . If I go to her and say "auntie," I would say "n 9 hei h w ."

(I see. But if you're talking about her to someone else you'd say n 9 hei ?)

Yeah, n 9 hei

(You know, that sounds quite a bit like naeheihae)

n 9 hei h w . n 9 hei h w . means "my aunt."

(And your husband's mother--?)

n 9 heihae It's a little different. That's my mother-in-law.

(I want to ask you to say the two of them close together. Say the word for mother-in-law.)

naeheihae

(Now the word for "auntie.")

naehei -- naehei h w . Almost alike. naeheihaehae is "mother-in-law." And n 9 hei h w . is "my aunite."

(And now--)

My uncle?

(Yeah.)

n e sih w .

(Say that one once more.)

n e sih w .

(O.K. If you're talking right to him, would you say that?)
