I guess so. (Laughter) But my dad was the councilman for years, I don't know how long. He was on a committee there, tribal committee there, and he advised me against going into tribal business. Tribal politics. But I never did run for office. And the first time I got in it. I was drafted. Our constitution says that fifteen people draft somebody that they want to run for office and that is how they got me in there.

(You been drafted ever since.)

Yeah. And well, my health was kind of bad for a while back in 1946 and I quit for a couple of years. But when they had their next election oh I was elected then.

(Andy, do you think the tribal council and the tribe organization is the best way that the Caddoes get some things that they need.)

I think so, yeah. And that is the reason we adopted charter and constitution and by-laws. And it seems to be working very well.

(Let's see the tribe is incorporated isn't it?)

Yeah.

(Into corporate body? This housing venture up here the latest thing that you gotten into as a Tribe was houses.)

Yeah.

(Pretty good response to that?)

Yeah, it has been real good.
