(And how do you count it? How do they count?)

You have to count two at a time. When you flip it, if two black ones turn up, and the rest of them are all white, you have two points. But if one turns up black, and the others are white or the opposite way, you have five points. One flips up white or black; and the turtle, they call them turtles, I'll get you some and show them to you.

(How many points win' a game?)

Twelve.

(Twelve points?)

Hum-hum. You have 12 of them, what do you call them. And we used seeds to count your scores Buck Eyes.

(Buck Eyes?)

Yeah. Buck Eyes.

(To keep score?)

Mmm hum, to keep score.

(I saw the Kickapoos one time with the Kiowas. They were using beans, the round beans to keep scope.)

We use Buck Eyes.

Buck Eye seeds. We have some. They're just so old, they're just real shiny. They've been played with so much.

(Did the girls have a game like the Kaw's or stick ball like the boy's did?)

Yeah, we have straight sticks.

(You told me . . .)

They have a little bag, it's narrow in the middle, and kind of a ball shape on each end. And you have to run and get that stick and run to your goal.

(Run and get that stick and push it under bag and run to the goal?)
Ah huh, and keep it on your stick, and run with it.

(Have you played that game?)

Oh, yes.

(Interruption)

(What was that name?)

Jessie KaKaQue.

(Repeat)

And your grandfather was Logan KaKaQue.
