Just the rabbits, quails. That's all. But all these big animals were gone. But now we start having them. They put wild turkeys, wild deer—

I always see those wild deer around that South Canadian River. They put quails back too. They were gone. They used to hunt rabbits and squirels and quails, ducks.

ABOUT THE STORE IN FAY, OKAAHOMA:

(When you were little, before you went to school, do remember what kind of store you went to?)

Store? We used to go out on the wagen -- Fay. They have store.

(Where was this?)

Fay.

(Do you remember the name of the store?)

Fay. And it's still up. They moved to railroad-little town. It used to be just one store, blacksmith shop. We used to go there. But the day they got railroad, they moved, and build that stores and two grocery stores, and drug store, post office, restaurant, hotel, little town, but its just one store now, post office, one filling station, hardware. That's all. We used to come on wagons to Watonga. When we went to buy something. Stay all night. Pass it with the Indians that live around here. Go back home thenext day: About 15 miles.

(How long did it take by wagon to fay to Watonga?)

About half a day.

(What kind of things did they sell in the store back then?)

Groceries, dress goods--

(Did they sell things like shawls and blankets up there?)

You know--at ElReno--maybe you pass it, there used to be a superintend-
