(What was your mother's name?)

Oh, my mother's name was supposed to be medicine woman but they make it up. My father was known as Turkey Legs at that time. They put on his allotment, Turkey Leg, and on my mother's Little Cup. Her name was Little Cup. That was my father's name. Her name was supposed to be Medicine Woman.

(Did a lot of women have that name?)

Medicine Woman? Yeah. It's different words in Cheyenne, but it all has meaning like medicine. That's why you have all those Medicine Woman.

(Where did she come from?)

She's a Cheyenne, my mother. Her folks are Northern Cheyenne.

#### INDIAN MEDICINES:

(You mentioned today when we were talking that your husband knew something about Indian doctors?)

His father was a doctor.

(How did they doctor people?)

Oh, I don't know. They just have Indian medicine.

(How did they get paid?)

Oh, they just give them anything they wanted to give them. A shawl, money quila, dress goods.

(Do you know any kind of medicines they used?)

No, I don't know. Medicine don't grow here. It grows in Montana. That's
