Yeah. That's the way they used to do.

(Could they use any kind of fat?)

Any kind. Beef fat--skink fat--anykind.

(What was the name of this white medicine in Arapaho?)

(How do you just say "medicine in Arapaho?")

wəxu'u

(This fever medicine--how do you say that in Arapaho?)

haestəenwəwəxu'u

(How do you say just "fever"?)

hæ.shohu'ut (or hæ.sihou'ut)

(O.K. Now, this white medicine--did you ever get that yourself and fix it?)

I used to. I used to. And you know since my knee has been aching I been wanting to go down there, you know, and get that root. But I'm afraid to go down in the park. Winos always all be there. And right there--you know that football field? Just as they come in on the north side of the road, close to that creek. That's where we used to get it. I got some last summer. A man from Wyoming wanted me to send him some. And I went and got some up, you know. It's a long root. Long, white root. And I dug some up. And then some, they're round I got. They're big ones. And I went and got some and then I tie them--you know, string them together. And I dried them out here. So if I put them in a box they wouldn't get moldy on the way, you know. So after I dried them about four days I packed them in a small box and I sent it to that man. And he sent me some hide, sinew, dress goods and a blanket. That's the last time I got some.
