

time. And most of the people, they didn't like it on account of the lake--too close, you know. Kids used to all go down there. So they moved it over to Eagle City. They had pow-wow there. And then they move again and they had pow-wow four miles south of Canton. And then after that they'd have pow-wows over here at Barefoot.

MORE ON RABBIT DANCE

(But back in the days when you all were doing this Rabbit Dance--would you just have an evening of Rabbit Dance or would there be some other kind of activities, too?)

No, nothing. Just Rabbit Dance. Nothing else but Rabbit Dance. And it was young people that were having it. Now when these Cheyennes wanted to learn, they invite these boys up there to Fonda and they had Rabbit Dance all night there. And then one time they invite my boys down to Deer Creek and we went along and we went over there and they done Rabbit Dance there. And then they were invited to come down and run Rabbit Dance at Boone--down there in the Kiowa country. So we went down there.

(When was that?)

Oh, it's been a long time--I forgot what year it was. But anyhow we were down there.

(Where is Deer Creek?)

Deer Creek is Thomas. They used to call it Deer Creek.

(Did your boys sing together--I mean, did they all sing?)

Yeah. They all sing together and they all dance together.

(When did they learn how to sing--when did they start?)

Oh, they were little boys when my uncle used to take them to the drum and make them sing. They learned to sing there.
