Yes, well it was dried roots, or something. I don't know what kind of a plant.

COMMENTS ON SCHOOL DAYS:

(Frank, where did you go to school?)

Riverside, Chilloco.

(Did you finish up out there (at Riverside) ?)

No, it's just a grade school. I went to Chilloco Indian school finished up there. It really was my aim, my plans (to go to college) but I just couldn't make it. Doctor, I had trachoma, chronic case of trachoma. I couldn't ever make it to college. In my junior year at Chilloco, I lost out four months, because of trachoma. It cleared up in 1943, but I was up in years.

Well, I have a vocation I never did follow. I received a diploma in stock-raising, and I learned enough to masonry. I never did follow it. The Bureau superintendent used to tell me, Frank, do you know how much a brick..a brick-layer getting? I said, yes, I know how much they getting. He said, well what you doing over here? I said, well I never did follow that.
