

And that's him right here in the truck and me and Hamilton speaking there on the platform to the Indians. The Indians were all out thisaway. (Guy's note, by side of this picture says, "Guy Quoetone and Hampton Anderson on truck. Buffalo one of first put on the reserve in 1907, name Quannah. Killed for barbecue for Indians at First Craterville Fair.")

The buffalo's name was Quannah after Quannah Parker. When they brought him--introduce him to Oklahoma, that was just the buffalo's name. They named one of them old bulls "Quannah".

(He's the one that was barbecued?)

Yeah. Actually he was about to die of old age. Their herd's already increased, and Rush brought it and butchered for the Indians at the Craterville Fair.

(What year was that?)

I can't give it to you now, but it's after the World War I. Must be somewhere about '16 or '17. It's the same time when Craterville Fair was first organized.

The Lawton Constitution's got a record of those dates. The way you can find out from the Constitution Office, it's probably published--dated--under "Editor's Day". Because we was counciling on "Editor's Day" for the starting the Indian Fair. (This comment not clear.)

(You started the Indian Fair--?)

Yeah, "Editor's Day", the Indians and Frank Rush, all in conference to start the Indian Fair. After that day they started the Indian Fair. They elected old Indians for officers, like Hunting Horse and (name that sounds like "Kway-say-yah") and all them old Comanches. I was Vice-President and Herman Asenap was secretary. But me and Herman really run it. Herman's Comanche.

(You all started that Indian Fair?)

Yeah, we started the Kiowa Craterville Indian Fair. And we stayed with it till it ceased to be --transferred to Anadarko. That's the daddy of the American
