COMMENTS ON DRAWING NO. 101: TWO SUICIDE ANECDOTES

(I just wondered--this picture, right before that says "Girl shot at Rainy Mountain by Accident." (Drawing No. 100) I was wondering if that could be her husband that died.) (Drawing No. 101)

I just can't say who was shot accidentally. Right in here, after Quanah Parker's death, the only public person that got shot and died was my cousin, Wilfred. He was married and he made a self-inflicted wound, that I know of. And he was moved to my uncle's home over here at Carnegie and the Buffalo Medicine Men tried to heal the wound and bring him back to life. He was shot right here in the shoulder. Right in the shoulder blade. He's married to a girl right there west of Hog Creek--a Paddlety. Paddlety's daughter. The boy's name was Willie Burton Aionty. He shot himself and he didn't die right off, when he shot, but he lived for a while. Finally died. But them early days lot of people got killed, but they're not Indian. And it could be I don't remember no Indian being shot during those years after the opening. There was Ben Popejoy--he got killed. On the Agency grounds, north. But he took his own life, too. Him and a girl were--I think they were to be married and she cancelled her vows to him, what she made, and after she cancel her part of it, the man tried to win her back and she drove out of town on the north side on the road going to the Indian Agency. And there was a high ten-foot board wall half a mile long and the sidewalk was going to town--from the Agency to town. And the highway was right beside of the sidewalk. And she came out coming out and drove on that road and just about half way of the long board stockade, she came out driving a single horse with a surrey and this man was chasing her on a high-bred horse. And passed her and she turn around and he jumped off his horse and talked to her in some way and she refuse him again and he walked over there and on the sidewalk shot
