He stayed at the hotel, but he sent for us to come to his hotel first thing after we got off. Before we had anything. We got there about eleven-thirty or something like that--about noon. And of all the people--I never saw so many people. That platform was--everybody was waiting for me and I see to come out of the train. And here we come. Oh, you ought to have seen the kodaks flash! Right under us! Newsmen, I guess. And our tribal attorney, John Fane, he's right there with the conductor and help us off the train. And those Indians run up there and shake hands with us. They was glad to see us. And the officers just led everybody away and made a aisle for us and we watch. And there was a big cab waiting for us--a government car. They led us in there and put us in the car to go to the hotel where General Scott was. And we went over there and we met General Scott at the hotel. We all went in and eat dinner together. And there was other Indians that came in later on. They join us. Well, Ernest Stecker and General Scott were both working with this L Troop, Seventh Cavalry, and most of those Indians didn't know how to speak English. So the Indians taught them the sign language. And they can speak to any tribe with their hands. And quick as we arrived there, General Scott commenced to make signs to Iseeo, how glad he was to see him and he said, "We gonna fight hard and win this case." He was making signs to him. It was already noon, so we walked up and went to the dining hall there. And it was a silent meeting--while everybody was eating they was talking. But they didn't talk out loud, but they were just talking with their hands. They were talking about old times. He asked him about the boundary line. He said he knew all about it. Our attorney told us how it is and after dinner-- Next day we're not supposed to have hearing that day, but we're supposed to meet our attorneys
