Rocks. Little rocks.

BEANS AND BLACK-EYED PEAS

(What other things did they used to raise back then--did they ever have anything else in their garden besides pumpkins and corn?)

Oh, they used to raise beans.

(What kind of beans did they have?)

String beans. And they had that what they call "black-eyed peas."

(What's the Arapaho name for "string bean?")

hiwóni.hi<sup>y</sup>hó<sup>w</sup>

(And what did they call these black-eyed peas?)

wá<sup>w</sup>taen<sup>w</sup>.kuθi<sup>i</sup> That means "black eye."

(How did they plant their beans?)

Well, they plant them just like we do, in short little rows. And they used to put sticks for them string beans to climb on. They used to put them like a wagon bow. And they used to grow up, them beans. That way they wasn't on the ground. That's the way they used to plant them.

(Did they ever dry them?)

They eat them when they were green. I don't think they ever dry them.

They didn't plant enough to dry.
