It fell you see during the fire. You can go around there and look at what's left. But while I, they took me to the (STATIC)

(But they helped waded over the river, But this was a long time ago. I don't know if you heard of her or not. Called (not clear) Meridian. But they built this fort back a long time ago. I don't know if you'd ever heard about it or not. Called the Glenn Fort.)

Well, I haven't. Because then when you have a child to take care of, and have to work and be father and mother you got to have--and way back when they didn't keep up with all. And that was another thing they did bad when they get back our generation ahead of us, didn't talk about us.

(Oh, they didn't?)

No, no papa had a younger brother, of course he is dead and gone. Uncle Dick Hinton he used to, they were all bachelors living over there, the house still stands. He used to tell us called the Duncan place. And so he came over here, and grandma would talk to him and he used to tell me lots of things when he visited me. And Sonny of course he passed on. So that's the way those things go.

(You never did hear about an old mass mill, when it used to grind mill or anything upon Blumgarder Hall?)
