MR. KAMINS: Your Honor, from reading the transcript, in reviewing Kr. White, who was the independent surveyor, who went to the site with the plaintiff and other parties, when asked -- when I asked Mr. White where did Mr. Chewie point when he was standing at the site of the arrest he said in a southwesterly direction, and I said to Mr. White, "Would that be out of Section 327" And he said, "No, because it was less than a quarter of a mile." Therefore, when we put the overlay on Section 32 and looked to the southwesterly corner from the site of the arrest, that land there was land held by the United States of America, purchased under the -- which we later found from Mr. Cook, the Jones Act held in trust for the Cherokees for their use and benefit, and it was not fee land, it was not domain land, and I think we could even substantiate because we have Mr. Daughterty here from the realty office in Muskogee that that land in Section 32 has been managed continually, since 1936, all of the land, by the Bureau and leased by
