point. This court must follow the law and I must look to my own jurisdiction, and I have to have something to establish jurisdiction. It is not just because of sympathy, or what I think, or by reading into it the inferences. I've got to have the law supporting it.

I see no -- you have not established any jurisdiction yet in this court.

HR. KAMINS:

Your Honor, I will

readily admit to the court we weren't prepared to go into the previous citations.

THE COURT:

You don't need to.

I've made that a part of the record of this trial. You don't need to do that. But, at this hearing, I'm talking about any evidence you want to put on today to establish to me the federal jurisdictional question. Number 1, and I want to find out what damages. But, so far you have got to tell me where the conflict is, first.

NR. KAMINS:

Your Honor, in

addition to the treaties, as far as the jurisdiction of this court, we have presented to the court, we feel, a prependerance of evidence that this is Indian country under the statute, under the definition of the statute.

In other words, the definition of the statute says "any land being held in trust or for the use and benefit of an Indian tribe." That's one section. Another section says
