(Did the Arapahoes have a name for the Mescaleros or the Apaches?)
Well, they just call them ʔwəw -- that's "Enemy". That's the way they call them.

(Did the Arapahoes and the Comanches used to fight with each other?)

No. I don't think so. They were enemies to Otoes and to Siouxs and to Pawnees.

(And also I wanted to check on these names for the different Arapaho districts. I think you said one time they used to call the Cantonment Arapahoes "Ugly-faced People"--would you say that name?)

wəxu'eiθi

(And you called another group the "Greasy Leggings"?)

ʔcaebínw t̃w .háeθi That was people that used to live a little bit west from El Reno and south--close to the river there (the South Canadian). West from El Reno and straight south.

(Would that include Charles Whiteman--was he one of that group?)

Yeah, he was ʔcaebínw t̃w .háet

(What about Black Coyote?)

No. His was right north of Geary there. His group--Geary--
wəseínw xhaèbi

(What does that mean?)

Just like when you blow away a horse.

(And Calumet?)

háeʔcaexw wə h̃w'w̃w

(What does that mean?)

"Small Town."

(What about the Watonga District--was there a name for that?)

wə'taénw'w̃w

(What does that mean?)

That was supposed to be "Black Coyote," but they call it "Black Horse."

(And the Colony group--was there a name for that?)

ʔcaenisibeit -- ʔcaenisibeithi

(What does that mean?)
