Now this said, "My child, I am the one that flied around." And then the second (verse) says, "My child, I am the one, when I flew, I roar." You know, like thunder. That's the words.

(What would that mean?)

It means, you know, when the thunder goes?

(Who would be speaking in this case--would it be God speaking?)

Yeah, God speaking to his child. "It's me that flies around.

It's me that roar."

(Myrtle repeats the Arapaho words slowly.)

(Are there two verses on that?)

Yeah.

(Next song, Number 25, played. Ghost Dance Song.)

Now this, it says, "This turtle river is yellow." And then it says, "I wade in this river. It's a turtle river. And this turtle river is yellow."

(What would that mean?)

Well, you know like a pond and somebody go in there and there's turtles in there and that water is yellow.

(Would this be like a man talking?)

A man.

(Is there any particular river that's call "Turtle River"?)

No.

(What are the Arapaho words?)

(Myrtle repeats Arapaho words slowly.)

(How do you just say "turtle"?)

báe' aenw

(And how would you say "turtle river"?)

báe' aenòuniiciw

(Did the Arapahoes used to eat turtles?)

Yeah.
