After the boys come home we used to Spoon Dance. I danced it. (These Wolf Songs, what's the name of that in Arapaho?) h ω .xhaehin ω .tin ω (These Wolf Songs--do you sing those before the boys go?) Yeah. (And then you have this Spoon Dance when you come back?) When they come back. (And it would be for their parents?) Yeah. (How about their--?) SCALP DANCE Everybody dance. Everyone. They used to be glad, to see them come back (Now, these Scalp Dance Songs are different yet or are they similar to the Spoon Dance?) No, they're not any different, I don't think. (Is there another word for Scalp Dance Songs in Arapaho?) cae ae.tin W.t. (What about these War Songs--is there a name for that in Arapaho?) ninù Oin .t (Are these War Songs different from these War Dance Songs that they sing (today?) Yeah, they're different. They different. WAR DANCE SONGS OR CROW SONGS (How would you call these War Dance Songs like they sing today at dances?) houn ω tin ω (What would that mean?) They call them "Crow Songs." (Do you know why they call them Crow Songs?) I don't knów. MORE ON' SCALP AND SPOON DANCES
