This woman (referring to picture of a woman wearing a war bonnet) was the mother of this Charlie Whiteman that just died not long ago. That's his mother.

(Was she wearing a war bonnet because she participated in the kind of a dance you were talking about?)

No. She was just a chief's daughter.

(What kind of occasions would a lady like this wear her war bonnet in public?)

Well, to show that she was a chief's daughter. And they give away for them. Yeah, her family.

(What was her father's name?)

Hey, I don't know her father. I just know she was married to a man by the name of White Man. I don't know her father.

(Here's another lady with a war bonnet on—that's from Wyoming.)
(Myrtle doesn't comment on this—she looks at picture of Ute.
Old Man Ute.

(Did Ute live at Greenfield?)

He used to live over there east of Geary there.
