### SCALP DANCE SONGS

(Next song, Number 50, played. War Song or Scalp Dance Song.)

Ocean Song. My husband put these words in there. When the boys goes out for a warpath, they always sing these songs. Yeah, I would call it a War Song.

(What would you call a "Scalp Dance Song"?)

Scalp Dance--when they go and fight and when they come back and when they bring the scalp from their enemy they used to sing them.

(You wouldn't sing this one for that, would you?)

Yeah, you could.

(Could you call that a Scalp Song, too?)

Yeah, or War Song--either one.

(How would you say Scalp Song or Scalp Dance in Arapaho?)

Scalp Dance-- hitaebiỹ ní. t

(And how would you say "War Song" or "War Dance"?)

nú tkú ní. ñ. t

(Could you say those Arapaho words?)

(Myrtle repeats Arapaho words slowly.)

(What do they mean?)

It means, "The ocean is big, but it makes no difference." See, because the boys went across.

(When did your husband put the words in this?)

In 1941. That's when our boys were in the service.

(Is the tune an old song?)

It's an old song, way back in olden days.

(Lot of these songs like this your husband put words to--do
