RABBIT DANCE SONGS

(Next song, Number 54, played. Rabbit Dance Song.)

This was an "Owl Dance" song, too, but let's put it as Rabbit Song. That's a Rabbit Dance Song. No words.

(Is this one of the one's that that Tom Hawk brought?)

Yeah, that's the one.

(What's the difference between the Rabbit Dance and the Owl Dance?)

It's no difference. They just made them songs that way. There ain't no difference in them.

(Would you say this "Owl Dance" is sort of a nickname?)

Yeah, a nickname. Yeah, because they stay up late.

(Next song, Number 55, played. Rabbit Dance Song.)

We already played this one (Probably same as Number 44). That was a Rabbit Dance, but we already sang that—yeah, this afternoon. That one that Tom Hawk brought.

WAR SONGS

(Next song, Number 56, played. War Song. Maybe same as Number 33)

This one, I put them words in there. When my grandson, Dennis, went in. His name is nibeline n -- that's his Indian name. "nibeline n, stay with it. You're a man." That's what I was singing. His Indian name means "Singing Man." That's an encouraging song. Yeah, it's a War Song. It's an old song, but I put words in it.

(Next song, Number 57, played. War Song.)

When I sing those sometimes I used to just cry. That's a War Song, that one. No words. It's an old song. I used to hear them when I just had two teeth. Yeah, when two of my tooths just come out I used to hear these songs. Real old song. (Next song, Number 58, played. War Song.)

Yeah, that's a War Song and no words in it. It's an old one. I used to hear them when I was a little girl.

(Next song, Number 59, played. War Song. Possibly same as Number 37.)
