No. I used to just call her "old lady." baetēbihi.s

(I think you told me that after she died it took a while for Lewis to get used to you all again.)

Yeah, it took a long time before he got used to us. He used to just wander away, you know. He'd go clear back to that house. When we moved to Plenty Bears' to camp for a while. Just think, he used to disappear and I guess to go back over there.

(Was that very far away?)

About four miles. His father used to have to go whenever he comes from work.

(When he got over there, was there anybody there?)

Nobody was there, but I guess he used to go in the house and just sit around in there. And he was about ten years old.

(Another thing I asked you that I didn't get your answer before the tape ran out, was--when the families lived together like that in one house, did they ever have any trouble with their in-laws. And I think you said--)

Oh, some of them do, but we never did have any trouble. Some of them over their kids--they take up for their kids, and that way they argue and fuss
