(I just--I can't keep it down.)

Yeah, they claim it's medicine and all.

(Well, it's hard. Oh, I have a lot--I have a lot of respect. I mean, I feel like you do, but it's not my business to decide anything.) Yeaha

(I have a lot of respect for --) Yeah, I can.

(I have a very good friend. One of the Apaches are real strong people.) Uh-huh.

(And they really, you know--they lead very good lives, and they're real good people like Frank Red Ball.)

Uh-huh.

(You know, he's just a real fine man, and he's a strong peyote. And I -and Albert Chalepah is another one that's--you know, that I think is a real fine man that's in the peyote church. And I talked to him about it, and I don't know. They're-there's a kind of sincerity about those meetings--I mean, you know, when you hear about them and never go into one, it sounds like everybody's just gets, you know, peyoted up, and, you know. But it's really very religious. There's the praying that they do and singing that they do. It's just different way, I guess, of approaching Cod.) INDIAN FOODS

Humm-humm, you know, excuse me. Something came into my mind. (laughter) I told you I can find a lot of things that are food.

(Yeah.)
