Come home, and they had--they had, you know, dance for him, you know. (Yeah.) TURKEY DANCE - WORSHIP - MANY SONGS And they dance that Turkey Dance. They had a pole in the middle like them Caddos. Had a scalp on top of the head of the pole, scalp was. And that's a--it's a--well, I might say it's a powerful dance. You know, it's for the-well, all them dances we use, it's, you know, powerful. (Yeah.) It's powerful for everything, you know. It's kind of a way for worship, you know. And what this Turkey Dance, they use it for when anybody comes home from a war, you know. They dance that. (Is that like--is the dance like the Caddo Turkey Dance or is---?) Yeah, it's--it's same thing, but, you know, they (pause)--yeah, they had this Turkey Dance. There's another (pause)--well, I don't know what they call it, but our tribe calls it Dog's Songs. (Mmmm-hmmm.) And they're good songs too. I--I seen them. They sing that kind. (Yeah.) You know, they sit around, you know. One of the--the time I saw them, they use little drúms. (Manman-hamman.) Yeah, gourds, you know, they was--have you seen these round gourds look like a doughnut? (Like peyote gourds?) Yeah, yeah, but it's -- I think it's made out of hide. '(Oh, oh.) Yeah, hide, you know. We had--my mother had one once, but I think McCarters

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
