I'didn't go down.

Susie : His car was in the garage.

Yeah. Gettin! it fixed/

Susie: We went to the baseball game once in town and we saw your

dad there.

Yeah. They tryin'-what they tryin' to do is /not clear/ every five years, this Medicine Lodge deal, you know: And we go up there

every five years and down here it's every year, I believe what they

trying to make it--

(Annyal event.)

Annual eyent.

Susie: Boy, I tell you they really feed you at Medicine Lodge.

All you have to do is put your order in and they will bring you whatever you want. I had the privilege there of giving my orders there. We told them we were getting tired of--what was it--was

it oatmeat?

Oatmeal,

Susie: We told them we had rather have cereal. We told 'em we liked it better.

She ordered bacon and eggs and -- /laughter/.

Susie: Well, they ask you-they come and ask you and there wasn't very many of us Cheyennes there. About six families of us there. See, there's Cheyenne, Arapaho, Kiowas and Comanches, and Apaches. That five tribes that sign that treaty up there. And they the ones

that goe's every five years.

Susie: Oh, they give you meat ever morning. And one morning they brought us, oh, there was boxes like this, bout that wide and ;bout that deep. Just full of meat (?) already cut. And then another one just more than that. And then another time they brought
