Yeah.

(How are they different!)

Well, difference—in early times they didn't decorate like they do now. Maybe it's just an old shirt, maybe it has not even awhat they call a neck deal now, and all them—

Yeah, that /not clear/. See, you got that bustle (?) and neck

(Did they make feathers on the neck, or a choker or

piece. Well, early times we just had maybe a bustle (?) and string of bells and a G-string on, you know. Rest was naked. Maybe a roach.

(Yeah.)

But now you see feathers, you know ...

(Yeah, everywhere.)

Men is wearing a shirt.

(Satin shirt of some kind. Yeah.)

Even you see some feathers hanging down this way, for a headband, you know.

(Did-when you say early times, now, did you mean when you were growing up or...?)

Yeah, in my early—when I was young, you know; well, this old man up here at Seiling—call him James Night Walker, he brought fancy war dancing to Oklahoma. He was from Montana. And today, he tries to dance. He's close to eighty years old what you see this fancy step now.

(Yeah. About what time did all this start to change?)

Well, I was about ten or twelve years old when he used to dance, you know. And about that time was when he had.
