And that day he come up on horseback. See it's eighteen miles from here to Fletcher. He drove up on horseback. I was still kinda sore at him for what he done to me. I said, so I said I sign off to go to school. He said, "Why I don't you tell me." I said I told you I was going off when I left, and I'm going. He was so took up, he didn't know what to say. Well, he says, "I'll bring your mother to see you before you go." I say I don't know how soon they'll come I say but I...we're old. I'm accepted I say. And silly as we was you know, it took us a days, and they had to bring to us here. And they gave us...they had this kind of a uniform for you. Just like we had a uniform and it was trimmed in white.
