All them childrens that went to school up there baptized by them.

(Was Rev. Creegis the superintendent the whole time you were there?)

Yeah. Yeah, he was.

(Did they call them camp meetings back then or did they call them by another name?)

I don't even know what they call them.

(How did they work? What did you do during that time?)

In the mornings we'd go to church...you know there's big church there.

Its still setting up there. And we would go to church in the morning.

And they have their servives and they sing and they preach and they sing, and pray and all the stuff, you know. Well, after dinner they don't do nothing. In the night time, there's a bunch of Indians come in, and then every night we have servives. Not too long, just a little while,

they have singing and if some one wants to say something, they just go ahead and talk. All the time we didn't know it was prayer meeting. All we did was just sit there and jiggle and laugh and pinch one another, and hit one another. We didn't know they was having prayer meetings. We just thought they was singing and having a good time. That's all I figured it was.

Didn't know nothing about praying or talking or anything. Well, we learned how to sing English songs, and up to today, I don't even know one of them.

(When they taught you the English songs did you understand what they meant?)

No, we never did. Its just like they learned us how to read. Its just seems like that. To me and to the rest of the kids. For during church
