(Now all the time you were going to that Cache Creek Mission School, where were your parents?)

They were living....

(In that house they build on their section?)

Yes.

(Did they ever move from there?)

No. They just live there. Lot time since I was little girl.

(Then you were finished when you were seventeen?)

Some time like that. Yeah, but seventeen.

(When did you get married?)

I guess the same year I got out of school. In the year of 1912.

(Who did you marry?)

Clayton Weyahye. That was my oldest boy's father. I got a boy that lives in London.

(And where did you live when you first got married?)

We live with my mother and dad.

(What was your oldest boy's name?)

Andrew Weyahye.
