

(What did that presbyterian preacher think about the peyote church?)

He never did say nothing to us about it. He didn't say nothing. When they have meetings up here, my father would go over there, nearly every sunday, he goes up there and talk to them about the bible. Sometimes they just be coming out of the tipi in the mornings when they gets over there to talk to them. You have to drive from here up there in a wagon, or a buggy. When he gets there they be coming out of the tipi and he would talk to them, and they all sit down and listen to him. Ask him questions.

"What do you do?" And all the time when he went up there, all those years, none of them become a Christian. None of them. Here not very long ago the woman, her and her husband live over there, and they had a big family...here not to long when they built that church, she become Christian. She's dead now. Her husband died too. Both of them died.

(You can be a peyote church member and a Christian at the same time?)

Yeah, I guess so. I seen a lot of them. People are peyote members and Christians at the same time. I don't see no difference in it.

They talk like a preacher...and when you go to church it is the same thing.

They sing and talk and preach. We have nothing but Indian preachers at our church now. Up here at the church at Mt. Scott and over here.

This only one got white preacher and the one that coming out of Apache down that hill....he's a white man, and a white man over here at Cache Creek. Just this one and that one.

(What do they say about the peyote church?)

I don't even know. I don't hardly go to their church.

(Which one do you go to?)

Up here at Mt. Scott. Now we have to go up there whenever we feel like going to church. We used to go up here to this...round this curve
