spots of dirt lying around -- they awful cautious. And they'll sit around there, but they won't get to it. He's suspicion of the trap-a snare. They won't get in it. They're Also coyotes the same way. Coyote, he won't -- he won't go -- don't care how big the food is. They go around and around and around and (unintelligible phrase). But they won't come near where they see some fresh dirt. They think they's trap there. I don't know how they know it. Well, I've set my traps lots of times and they never bothered the bait; but I could see where they had been going around and around for two or three nights. Well, if you don't move it sometimes after being two or three nights going around they think it all right and then they'll go in and get in. But I learned that, so I just put it just like I did this eagle--judge this coyote's stretch, was made. And put the trap about there. And the dirt you take out when you dig the holes, you have to take it way off so they--and the coyote and earle both--I don't know how they know it--but they got a smell or something -- They can smell human scent on the grass. When I put the trap there, I take the blood from the animals and I drag it over. I drag all over the grass and it looks like nothing but animal scent. They think you kill the animal and left it there and then they get in there. You have to outsmart them -- they awful smart. And I caught many coyotes, put they hard to catch. Other times, I have to put five or six different traps all around to get !em. But I've caught them with just only one trap. I put trap here on this side. Then I fix it and put scent on it. Then over there, where I haven't got no traps, I put the stob that held the chain under the ground. Put (unintellible word) there. Then over here where it's nothing, I dig the ground up and make the scent on that side and put all the scent on that side. And they--where they's no trap, they afraid and then go back over here and they think this side is clear and they get in Just one trap.

(My, that's real smart.)

I got lot of experience in it. You have to learn how to--

(But this eagle trap, was it up on top of a hill?)

This one I caught?

(Yeah.)

Yeah, on top of this limestone hill. And lot of-where you set it, it's grass and gravel
