And if he has those two and he use them to fan his, the patient, all over. Sometimes, they have other birds. Some of them have rare birds. Such as--you know what a cormorant is?

WATER CROW OR WATER TURKEY (ANHINGA):

(I've heard of it, but I don't know--)

Our people call them water crows. Water crows. And they're rare birds. They're Mexican cormorants. They're more popular in around Mexico. Well, they're three different kinds of crows, too. We have this little black crow. Then another crow--another crow. We don't have them here, but they got him in west Texas. Larger crow. And then they got the white crow in Old Mexico. White crow with black streaks in the tail feather. Maybe you'll see some medicine man wearing those--carrying those white crow tail feathers. And when he go to doctor, you must get one of them white crow feathers for him before the patient well. And they're rare! And they--and you have to give some substitute that he get one.

(Well, you know this water crow? This Mexican Cormorant? What did you call that in Kiowa?)

Tomasa. Now when that lake--Lake Lawtonka was first built, quite a few came over there. Those water crows from Mexico. They immigrated in there. Migrated in, and several of them were killed by duck hunters and you could see Indians going around the lake dam hunting them. Them white people, them game rangers--they just kill them for sport. They
