

Just general work. We had to wash dishes or help with the cooking or tend to the children or whatever. Just regular home making. We all had jobs to do. That's one thing..we were all taught how to work.

(Were there any certain jobs that girls did and boys didn't do?)

Well among our people the girls were supposed to learn home making and they could not marry until they accomplished that they were trained to do certain kind of work like cooking and tanning and what have you. Just everything in home making.

(What sort of things did the boys do?)

Well they helped with farm work and tended to the stock cause the Indians then had a lot of stock.

(Did you ever have wild game to eat?)

Oh, yes. There was plenty of wild game.

(Who hunted for it?)

Uh, the men folks.

(What kind of animals would they get?)

Well, deer and coon and such stuff as that. I think back in the earlier days they said they had bear as one of the main ones.

(Was there any sort of food that you weren't supposed to eat?)

No, we didn't have any restrictions to that.

EXPERIENCES AT CARLYLE:

(What did you do after you got out of this Indian school over at the mission the Catholic mission?)

I went off to Carlyle, Pennsylvania. That was in 1917 during the First World War.
