(That was Julia Mulkehay?)

Yeah. And Guy Guetone, he was preacher then. We had a nice church. I worked, there. I'm not a Methodist, but I worked for them. I worked under four preachers. It was kind of a job.

(Well, is Julia gone now?)

No, she's still (living)

(How old is she?)

About between sixty-five and seventy, somewheres.

(She's Apache?)

Apache. You don't hardly see her much. She's pretty near close to her daughters Right there at Boone.

(Evelyn: She lives right there at Boone.)

Right across the creek there.

(Evelyn: She lives with her daughters.)

(Who's her daughters?)

(Evelyn: She's got four daughters, I think, or five. They all live right there.

There's Mary--one's named Mary Rockwell--she lives right there--they're building a new addition to their house right off the highway. There's another one called Sandra and she's building a home right there. And another one called Martha--she lives right next house from this Mary. Then there's Imogene. There's four.)

There's all married to Spanish--Rockwell, he's Italian.

(Evelyn: The others are all married to Mexicans.)

They're all my relatives.
