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Well, it was just like that...the groom's side and the bride's side that's the same what I said. I went through the Indian wedding. (You told a little bit about the groom sending horses to the bride's brother. Would you like to tell about that?)

Oh, that's way back. That's way back. Like I used to hear my grandfolks say, you know, like my father's uncle, he was the chief and he had four wives. You asked how he got them wives...well, if he wanted, you know, a girl or lady, well, he'd get his horses and just take them over there to her brother. He'd say, "I want your sister," and told her name, and that's the way he got her, but that's, oh, way back. Back in them days when they had ponies.

(And if she didn't have a brother, who got the horses?)

Well, maybe her cousin. You know, someone close. You know, I used to 1 ke to listen to old folks tell like I was telling you about . my father's mother. Oh, she was a short old lady, but my father's tall, his father was tall, but my grandma, she was a little old lady. She wasn't hard hearing, and when we was out with rag dolls playing we'd say, "Let's go listen to grandma, let's go ask her questions." We used to go sit around her and ask her questions about her days when she was young, and she used to tell us. She used to always like to weave quilts, something to do, and she was blind but she could thread a needle. She'd put it on her tongue and thread a needle, and we used to all sit around and she'd tell a story.
