That's when we gave a horse for him. And then the girl...we gave a horse away at the Sun Dance. But the baby, he was just a year old. But now they don't do that. 'Cause nobody has horses. Yeah, if you my mother used to, they used to use these bullets, you know, the lid, and then she'd get it real fine, and then one side used to be sharp and the other side dull, then you press it every morning, she used to say when they were three or four months old, and that way, you know, they don't feel them or jerk them.

(Was the Indian name given before or after the ears were pierced?)

No, as soon as they were born, well, we named them. As soon as they were born. I had to get birth certificate for my son when he was I think, six years old, and I had to tell about them old folks and Dr. Hart. He signed it. His names on it. Oh, he was a real good doctor.

INDIAN CLINIC IN CANTON:

Anytime Indians needed a doctor they'd call on him, and he came. And he knew their rules. When they used to have their medicine bags out, he used to pass back to look after the patient. Go back the same way. If he knew that the patient needed pills, well, he'd give them. The Indians hardly ever fought against him. But now this clinic is no good.
