Huh huh.

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Uh huh. They tried to make me go over there and help with it, but oh, I didn't. I didn't care too much about doing that anymore. I was big myself. I didn't want to.

(How many babies have you helped deliver?) About three. Four.

(How many have you delivered all by yourself?) Two.

(What do you do after they come out?)'
You clean them. Clean their cord first and drain them. And you have to clean
their eyes out real quick, you know, before all the stuff goes in there, you
know. Doctor's said sometimes it causes them to have uh--well, anyway, he
said sometimes it causes babies to be blind later on.
(With water or just with a cloth?)
Cotton. And water, warm water.
